

Scene Structure Breakdown: A 3-Act Deep Dive

● ACT I – THE SETUP (0–25%)

Mission of scenes in this Act: Establish the ordinary world, hook the viewer, introduce conflict.

Common Scene Purposes:

- Introducing the protagonist in action
- Hinting at their flaw or wound
- Establishing relationships or routines
- Laying out what’s “at stake”
- Inciting Incident occurs (usually by page 10–12)

Scene Tips:

- Start scenes late, end early
- Set tone and visual motif early
- Include conflict or contrast, even in setup scenes

● ACT II – THE CONFLICT (25%–75%)

Mission of scenes in this Act: Escalate problems, deepen character stakes, reveal what must change.

Act IIa (25%–50%) — *The Attack*

- Protagonist reacts to the Inciting Incident
- Trying solutions, failing or learning
- New characters, subplots emerge
- Midpoint twist or reveal (~50%) shifts direction

Act IIb (50%–75%) — *The Descent or Deepening*

- Plans fall apart or get darker
- Stakes escalate emotionally
- Characters reach breaking point

- Seeds of final transformation or failure planted

Scene Tips:

- Every scene must move the story *and* character forward
 - Vary pacing, location, tone—but keep emotional tension alive
 - Use reversals: what a character wants vs. what they get
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● **ACT III – THE RESOLUTION (75%–100%)**

Mission of scenes in this Act: Deliver payoff, character change, and emotional closure.

Common Scene Purposes:

- Climax (truth is confronted, change occurs or fails)
- Tying up subplots
- Final confrontation or catharsis
- Visual echo or emotional callback to Act I
- Closing image or takeaway

Scene Tips:

- Use silence, contrast, or callbacks to early beats
 - Give every major character some form of resolution
 - Make the ending emotionally inevitable—but not predictable

Every scene should be able to answer these:

- Who wants what—and what's in their way?
- What changes from beginning to end of this scene?
- How does this scene advance plot, deepen theme, or reveal character?
- What's the emotional current running underneath the dialogue?
