4. **Character Backstory Builder**

Ask: “What childhood event might shape a woman who is now afraid to trust anyone?”

5. **Script Formatting Help**

Use **ArcStudio**, **WriterDuet**, or **Highland 2** (with AI plug-ins) for script formatting assistance.
